

I have an old friend who claims that George Washington played bridge as a general at Valley Forge (no, my friend isn't that old, he's just a historian). I told him that maybe Washington played whist, but not bridge. "Eisenhower played bridge," I said, "and also General Alfred M. Gruenther, who served as Deputy Chief of Staff under Eisenhower during World War II." I remember one national tournament in Washington, DC, many years ago, where Gruenther was introduced to the players. He was probably the best player in the army in those days. See if you can match his declarer play on this deal. Gruenther was South in 4S against a diamond lead. How would you play it?

Gruenther won with the ace and led the 5 of trump. West won the ten and continued with the king of spades. Gruenther won and crossruffed for 10 tricks. He lost two trump tricks and one diamond — there seemed to be nothing to it.

But the best plans of generals are in laying the ground work. The concession of a trump at trick two was the key play. If he had led ace and a trump, West would have drawn a third round. And if he had tried to crossruff the hand before giving up a trump trick, East would have overruffed in clubs to set the contract. Gruenther had to lose exactly one trump trick and then cash the ace of trump to keep control.

One of the favorite bidding strategies of the star players is to preempt the opponents at favorable vulnerability. This is especially true when the opponents are playing a very accurate strong-club system. But the strategy requires some temperament. See if you think two famous Italian Blue Team legends, sitting North-South (named Belladonna and Garozzo), did good or bad on this one.

3♠

West was Mike Becker, using a relay club system with partner Ronnie Rubin. After the 1H opening and 2C artificial game force response, South felt compelled to do something to ruin the opponents' machinery. The overcall of 3C was a little risky, but seems reasonable under the circumstances. Unfortunately, there was partner to contend with. When West bid 3S, North, with a defenseless hand, leaped to 5C. Perhaps 4C is better, giving partner a little leeway.

Against 5C doubled, Becker led a trump to the 10 and queen. At trick two South led a low diamond. Becker ducked and the queen won. Two more rounds of diamonds were played. Becker cashed both major-suit kings, showing partner what he held, then led the 10 of hearts to Rubin's ace. Rubin cashed the ace of trump and led another trump, so the defenders took three spade tricks, two hearts, one diamond and one club, for down five. In those days the score for down five was 900 points.

North-South consoled themselves by pointing out that East-West were cold for a slam in either major, but the Italian pair at the other table did not reach slam, which is about a 50% contract. Well, were North-South right to put up their barrage? I personally don't think so.

Recorder Slips, should you need them, are available from the directors.







Jennbridge: Kibitzing the Reisinger

I came home early from the NABC in Seattle and had the opportunity to witness some fine play, along with expert commentary on Bridgebase. This hand was particularly impressive.

Reisinger-A Pretty Play



6 NT by West

First, the bidding. After Versace made a 2/1 game forcing bid, Lauria availed himself of the opportunity to make a jump rebid in ♥, a bid showing a solid suit after a 2/1 bid. After a ♠ cuebid by Versace and a 4♥ bid by Lauria, Versace could envision a large number of tricks and pulled out the master bid: 6NT! This bid was designed to protect his ♦ king, take advantage of any other opening lead and gain that all-important extra 10 points in the BAM event.

A diamond was led and the best was yet to come--the play! South returned a \forall after winning the \diamond ace and Versace prepared his squeeze. Before running his hearts, he carefully cashed the \diamond ace (a Vienna Coup), and also cashed the \diamond king and the \diamond ace.

Now on the run of the hearts South, forced to make 6 discards, was unable to both hold onto his ♣ king and keep the spades guarded. As the ♣ king had not made an appearance by the time all of the hearts had been played, Versace led the last ♠. The ♠ queen was played perforce and he claimed his slam for a win on the board. His opponents stopped in a pedestrian 4♥.





Hand Analysis of Hands from the Under 21 Junior Trials by Stan Subeck



The EW pairs at both tables were overly aggressive on this hand. A -300 push board is hardly pretty.

At Table 1, West chose to use Lebensohl to show an invitational spade hand. A 2S bid might be better judged given that suits probably weren't breaking. With a good fit East can still raise or compete in spades. As it is East should unquestionably pass the 3S bid. He has a minimum non-fitting hand. Perhaps East was confused about their Lebensohl structure.

At Table 2, where NS was silent, West made a stab at inviting by transferring and showing a six-card suit invite. With a minimum East should probably Pass, but vulnerable at IMPS, 4S is not totally unreasonable. Depending on the super-acceptance structure used by EW, it might be possible to stop in 2S.

All-in-all, I would not be surprised to see the same -300 results from two very good experienced teams.
