In the great tradition of American humour, the title of "First American Humorist" rightfully belongs to Benjamin Franklin. He was the beginning of a long line of writers who created a uniquely American form of humour filled with clever wit, folksy wisdom, and a generous portion of irreverence.

In his Poor Richard's Almanac, Franklin wrote many clever sayings which are still part of our cultural heritage today. At 26, Franklin published the first edition of Poor Richard's Almanac under the pseudonym Richard Saunders.

Keep your humor light, fun, open to participation.

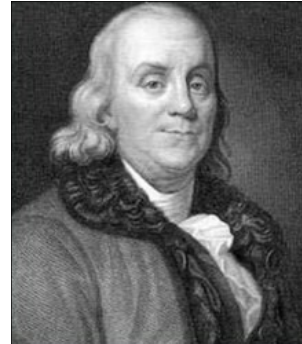
Reflect your humor to show you row your own boat.

Their maximum speed: 40 mph or over 100 mph while in a dive.

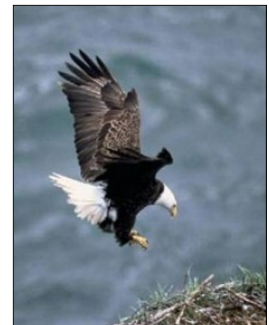
They can lift roughly half their body weight.

Here are some funny things I've seen while playing bridge... from the Bridge Bum Blog.

Playing with a stranger on OKbridge, I agree to Standard American, plus Cappelletti and some other gadgets she insists on. The way I see it, who cares what you play with pickup partners. Better to just humor them so they can concentrate on judgment and reasoning, which are ten times more important.

So lo and behold, I find myself with a good one-suiter after the opponents open 1NT. Dutifully I bid 2C (an artificial relay to 2D). Partner bypasses the relay and we wind up in a horrible spot for some horrible result. Confused, I ask her if we are playing Cappelletti. "Yes," she replied, "but I thought you forgot."

In an instant matchpoint game with a novice friend, I pass on one of the boards as dealer. LHO opens 1H and partner overcalls 1S, and with some sort of goodish hand I eventually push us to 4S. This however, does not satisfy partner, who after several moments' thought brandishes the 4NT bidding card (Blackwood). After finding me with one ace, he signs off in 5S. Now, this winds up making, but only because the opponents duck one of their THREE aces. Dear God, partner made a slam try needing three aces from a passed hand! After the session, I try to explain to him the fallacy of his logic, and he nods understandingly. To this day, I'm pretty sure he still doesn't get it.

This is utterly ridiculous, but I've seen it now three times. RHO opens a 5-card major and ends up with a trump guess with this layout:

From the Bridge Bum

Blindly adhering to Zia's rule, "If they don't cover, they don't have it," declarer leads the jack, expecting me to cover with the queen. When I don't cover, declarer cleverly puts up the king and finesses into my queen-doubleton. Think about it. Unless declarer is missing the A10 and is trying a Chinese finesse, what on earth does covering the jack accomplish? If you cover, declarer's guess is ALWAYS solved. In each of the three instances declarer guessed wrong, a game swing was generated. One woman even complained to her husband, "Well, I tried your little rule, but it didn't work...."

Playing with another OKbridge pickup partner (of supposedly advanced caliber), I hear RHO open 1NT (15-17), and with a weak hand I pass. Partner doubles in the balancing seat, and after the contract makes two overtricks my partner asks why I didn't bid. "My double was takeout," he accuses.

Neill Currie told me of the time he was playing in a regional and one of his little bidding concoctions, a 2D preempt showing 4-4 in the majors, came up. Of course, one of his opponents asked about the alert, and Neill had to explain. Not three months later Neill runs into the same opponents, except that one of them has the 2D preempt listed on her convention card, with her last name attributed to it! The sincerest form of flattery, I guess.

I must relate a good story given to me by Dan Molnar a couple years ago at the Nationals. On the subject of skip bids: "RHO pulls out the skip bid card and bids 2S. I've got nothing, so I'm counting to 10 and then I pass. Next thing I know, RHO is calling, "Director! There was a hesitation."

The football season was coming to an end and the regional playoffs were this weekend. Millersville’s high school team, the Bulls, had made it to the playoffs and hopes were high as the whole town counted down to the weekend and game time.

Millersville High School hadn’t had a winning football team in years, and this year’s team had been undefeated during the regular season. The star player on each of the four contending teams played a different position. Determine the name of the four contending teams and the full name and position played of each star player.

1. The star player for the Bulls was a quarterback but his first name wasn’t Elliot.
2. The Chargers’ star player was Alex, who wasn’t a kicker. The receiver didn’t play on the Lions team.
3. Elliot’s last name wasn’t Fenn. Charlie’s last name was Koning.
4. Brandon wasn’t a receiver.

6. The player whose last name was Mansfield played for the Lions. The quarterback wasn’t Charlie.

Facts About People

Shakespeare's tombstone in Stratford's Holy Trinity Church bears this inscription, said to have been written by him: "Good friend, for Jesus' sake forbear to dig the dust enclosed here. Blest be the man that spares these stones, and curst be he that moves my bones".

Opening Lead: ♥K

I was taking birthday requests for hands for this column and Susan Harbour sent in this one, played by Daniel Korbel, of Toronto, partnered by Danny Miles. Korbel reached 4S: and received the lead of the king of diamonds.

West switched to a trump at trick two. Korbel won in hand and ruffed his other diamond, then took a heart finesse, leading low to the queen. After drawing trumps, he cashed the ace of hearts, dropping the king, and continued trumps til the bitter end. When the last trump was led, South held the 3-2 of hearts and the ace of clubs. Dummy held the jack of hearts and three clubs. West had to come down to three cards. He held two hearts and the king-jack of clubs.

West was caught in a criss-cross squeeze. If he threw the jack of clubs, South could cash his ace and lead a heart to dummy. If West threw a heart, South could cash the jack of hearts and lead a club back to his hand (where he held the 13th heart).

One of my favorite bridge players is Mary Jane Farell. She once brought home a slam as my teammate by going against the odds, playing for a queen to drop instead of taking the normal finesse. Since there were no clues in the auction, after the session I asked her how she found the winning play, and she replied, "Mother's intuition." Her son, James Kauder, just happens to be the author of my favorite bridge book, "Creative Card Play, the cure for unimaginative bridge."

Kauder was South in a rubber bridge game and reached, in two bids, what looked like an impregnable 6♠ slam. Kauder took the heart lead with the ace and ruffed a heart. Then he led a spade to the ace and the 4 of spades (nice try), which West won with the king. Still, Kauder was about to claim when suddenly West led the queen of clubs.

Perhaps you've also felt the sudden embarrassment that came over Kauder's face (it's happened to me) when your easy contract is suddenly in jeopardy. Kauder won the club queen with the king and cashed the king of diamonds. Did West really hold a singleton in one of the minors, and if so, which one? Kauder guessed wrong (he needed his mother's intuition!) and blamed himself afterward for not cashing a top diamond and top club before leading the trump from dummy.

Put yourself in East's shoes, after partner leads the 2 of diamonds (fourth best) against South's 3NT contract. Declarer calls for the 9 from dummy. At the table, East played the 10 and declarer lost one heart trick and three diamonds to make his contract. Can you defeat this contract?

To begin with, East may assume that South holds three diamonds to the jack. If South held the ace-third or three small diamonds, he would have played the queen from dummy. If South held A-J-x of diamonds, there's not going to be any way to defeat 3NT. So East assumes his side can set up three diamond tricks. But he must make two more tricks. South holds the rest of the points, and has nine tricks if he holds queen-jack third of spades or queen-jack fourth of hearts (four clubs, one diamond, one major-suit ace, and three tricks in the other major suit).

Suppose South holds a doubleton spade. This is a cute position. If West gets in to lead a spade, declarer must play low from dummy. East will win the king and declarer may still have to give up a heart trick to the king. So East's plan is this: Win the king of diamonds at trick one; return a diamond at trick two; win the king of spades at trick three; return a diamond at trick four; sit back and wait for the king of hearts and a third diamond trick.

One little problem: How does East get partner to switch to spades at trick three? One idea is to lead back the ten of diamonds at trick two. But this will backfire, because West will duck to set up his third diamond trick, thinking East has started with K-10-x. Suppose East returns the normal 3. West will know diamonds are 4-4, and might get the idea to switch to spades before leading another diamond, but it won't be easy. The best return at trick two is the 8 of diamonds. Now West sees no future in diamonds, since it looks like South holds the jack-ten; West should go up with the ace and try the spade switch.

Opening Lead: ♦10

Victor Mitchell used to say, "Bridge makes fools of us all." This is especially true at matchpoints, where the desire for overtricks offers more opportunities for mistakes. Here's a fine example from the North American Open Pairs at the Philadelphia Nationals last month. It was reported by Gene Benedict, who sat West and led a diamond against 3NT.

Declarer won the queen and cashed five spade tricks. Benedict threw a diamond and two clubs, while his partner, Bob Brandow, threw two hearts. Declarer pitched a club and diamond from dummy, then led the 5 of clubs to the 9, 10, and queen. Instead of returning a diamond, East now made a cute shift to the queen of hearts. If West had held the A-J-x of hearts, this shift would produce three heart tricks. But South won the trick with the ace and then cashed the king of hearts and ace of diamonds.

At this point, declarer had nine tricks, and still held the 2 of hearts and the A-6 of clubs, facing dummy's jack of diamonds and J-8 of clubs. East was down to the K-3 of clubs and one heart, and South knew it. So rather than cash out for 10 tricks, South played his deuce of hearts to throw East in with the jack (or so he thought). But West won the trick with the jack and cashed two diamond tricks to hold the contract to three.

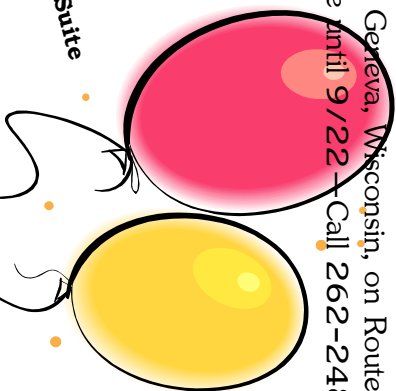

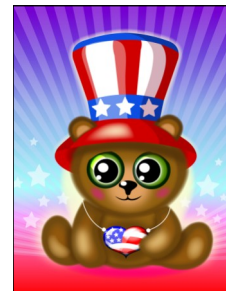
