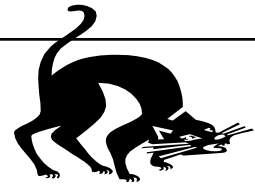

The Championship Flight and Flight A events will take place over four sessions and will be concluded in a single weekend. ****In Flight B alone, there may be two teams remaining at conclusion of play on Sunday. These teams will be responsible to determine a final date and place (area club) at which to play their Final. The Coordinator will work with the teams to find suitable arrangements for Final.**** (See CoC on the District 13 website for more information.) Flight C will be a two-session Swiss Team event played to conclusion on **Sunday only**.

There will be no competition among flights. Players must choose the flight in which they plan to play.

Flight eligibility is established by ACBL's September 2016 masterpoint cycle. This information was produced on August 6, 2016 in Horn Lake, MS. **Masterpoints won after this cycle will not impact flight eligibility for these events.**

Players must reside in District 13. Each member of the team must be a paid member in good standing with the ACBL. Club qualifying may be required at the discretion of each Unit. A Flight B or C team may qualify under the rules of any Unit where a plurality of team members reside.

In addition, players who are currently, or have ever been in the past, members of another bridge organization, whether domestic (e.g., American Bridge Association) or foreign (e.g., Polski Związek Brydza Sportowego), must submit information on their past and/or current ranking in that organization. Submissions must be in writing (email is fine) and must be received by the District GNT Coordinator or District 13 Director at the time of registration for the event. The information submitted may be used to assign a conversion to ACBL masterpoints for purposes of verifying flight eligibility.

****An entry in the CHAMPIONSHIP Flight is a commitment to play in the National Final. Entries in lower flights may play to conclusion before declaring intent. We understand your reluctance to commit in advance.****

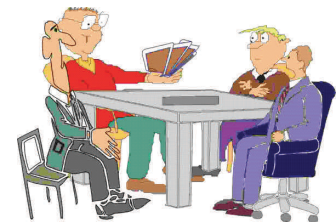

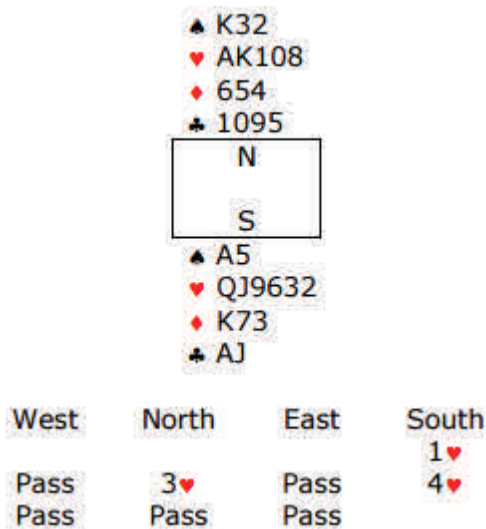


Black Magic By Bill Jacobs

Bill Jacobs has won many Australian national championships, and has twice represented his country at Open level. He regularly provides astute vugraph commentary on Bridge Base Online. For the past ten years he has been editor of the monthly bulletin of the Victorian Bridge Association.

Bridge is a game of infinite variety. In particular, and despite there being just 13 tricks to a deal, card-play offers seemingly unlimited potential for unusual strategies. In this series, we will look at examples of unusual plays that give off an aura of black magic. Some involve deception; others are simply technically correct approaches that do not initially leap to mind.



West leads ♠Q.

There are 9 top tricks, and finding East with ♦A will lead to an easy tenth. Is there any other chance?

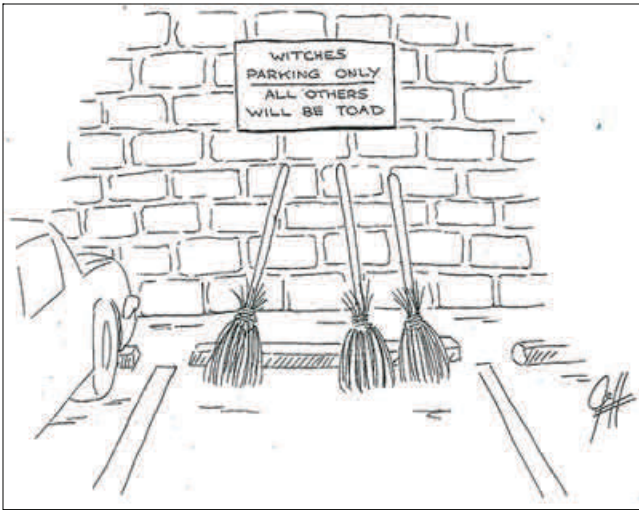
Indeed there is. You can add another arrow to your quiver by playing for East to have both the king and queen of clubs (or, less likely, Qx or Kx in clubs).

You must allow the ♠Q to win the first trick!

Let's assume a second spade is now played. Win your ♠A, play to the ♥10 and lead a club up, intending to play the jack. If this loses, then you will later play the ♣A (just in case the other honor drops), discard a losing diamond on your ♠K and hope the diamond finesse works.

When you lead the club toward your AJ, if RHO plays the K or Q, you win the ace, lead a heart back to dummy, discard your CJ on the SK and take the ruffing finesse in clubs. Even if this loses, you will have been able to discard two diamonds on the clubs and make the hand.

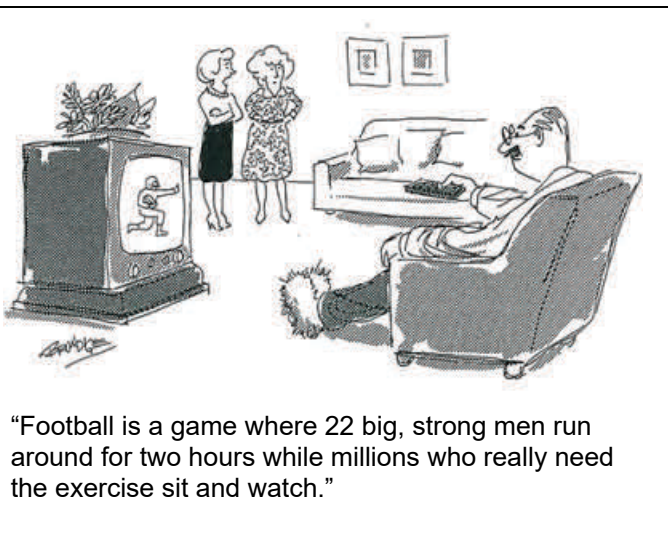

Deductive Reasoning By Frank Stewart

“I say, Holmes, tax day is drawing near.”

“I never pay any income tax, Watson,” Sherlock Holmes said. “I make too many brilliant deductions.”

South dealer
Both sides vulnerable

Holmes was today’s declarer at 6NT — reached on a simple auction — and West led a club. Holmes won with the jack. He next cashed the K-A of hearts and conceded a heart to West. Holmes won the club return and took the A-K of spades and then the ace of clubs, discarding a diamond from dummy. He led a diamond to the king and cashed the good hearts.

Holmes was left with the A-J of diamonds, and dummy had a diamond and the jack of spades. West had to unguard his queen of diamonds to keep the queen of spades, and Holmes led to the ace. His jack won the 13th trick.

“Amazing,” Dr. Watson marveled. “Why didn’t you finesse in either red suit?”

“Deduction. West chose a dangerous opening lead. After our auction to 6NT, he would have preferred a safe lead if one were available. I expected him to hold all four queens.”

Zia Mahmood in Action

26th BERMUDA BOWL Stockholm 1983 (Source: www.ecatsbridge.com)

This hand was played in an invitational tournament in India in January 1983, North-South, using a strong club system, found their way to the excellent slam very efficiently. And the slam was due to make against routine defense, even though the club finesse was due to fail.

If West had led a major suit, South would have drawn trumps, discarded his diamonds on dummy's hearts and eventually have taken a losing club finesse. But a small diamond doesn't work either. East would win the ace and probably return a club. South would rise with the ace, cash the ♥J, ruff out the ♦K and draw trumps. All the clubs in the closed hand would be discarded on the hearts, and the ♦J would take the 12th trick.

But West, Zia Mahmood "in a flash" put the ♦K on the table — and suddenly the slam was unmakeable. After winning the opening lead, Zia led a second diamond, forcing dummy to ruff. Declarer's only remaining option was the club finesse, and of course that was doomed to failure.

Why did Zia lead the king instead of the more usual small diamond?

The bidding had indicated that dummy would have a singleton diamond, and it was unlikely that it would be the ace. So Zia wanted to protect against the actual position.

Zia's opening lead has to be one of the best of 1983.

When you win this you can follow with one of: a trump, a spade, ♠Q or ♣J. Pause for a moment to think about declarer's handshake. If he started with 7 spades there is no defense. So 6412 – you know the diamond was singleton from partner's count-card. Declarer had 4 tricks in hearts, 5 in spades and 2 aces. But if you return anything but a SPADE he can contrive a 12th trick by dummy reversal, trumping a diamond high and finessing against your ♥10. Returning a spade cuts an essential line of communication. There is another, spectacular, way to break this contract – duck ♠Q.

Opening 1NT with a singleton: It's officially legal

The ACBL Board of Directors removed a legal gray area surrounding semi-balanced notrump openers when it approved a change to the definition of a notrump opening in the General Convention Chart. The change allows players to open 1NT with hands that include a singleton ace, king or queen, as long as they do not also contain a doubleton.

Here is the new definition, effective Aug. 1:

“A notrump opening or overcall is natural if, by agreement, it contains no void, at most one singleton which must be the A, K or Q and no more than two doubletons. If the hand contains a singleton, it may have no doubleton.”

This includes hand patterns such as 5-4-3-1, 6-3-3-1 and 4-4-4-1, in addition to those that were previously allowed, such as 4-3-3-3, 5-3-3-2 and 5-4-2-2.

The change was recommended by the Competitions and Conventions Committee, a group of players appointed by the Board, in an effort to bring regulations in line with popular and expert practice, said ACBL Field Manager Sol Weinstein, who supervises tournament directors.

Before, opening notrump with a singleton was considered a psych. It was legal to do, but players could not have an agreement to open such hands 1NT or 2NT. The lack of clarity was a thorny issue for directors.

“Many players were doing it anyway,” Weinstein said, particularly when a different opening would create a problematic rebid. “They decided it's not right to have a rule that's contrary to the way bridge is being played.” The idea of expanding the definition has been discussed for years within the committee, but previous proposals have failed because they lacked the simplicity of the new definition.

“The Laws don't allow you to limit bridge judgment,” Weinstein explained. “Regulations have to conform to the Laws.”

The new definition prohibits opening notrump with more shapely hands, such as 5-5-2-1, 6-4-2-1 or 7-2-2-2. “All of this has to do with your agreements,” Weinstein noted. “That doesn't prohibit an out-and-out psych, but you can't keep doing that or it becomes an agreement, and an illegal one at that.”

The change does not impact the one allowable exception of a partnership agreement where 1NT is treated as a 100% forcing opening bid (and not considered “natural” with any distribution). The use of such an unbalanced, non-natural 1NT opening must be alerted.

Sitting South. How would you plan the play in five diamonds? West leads a club. East winning with the queen and continuing with the king.

The declarer was Jan Wohlin who died in 1999. He was on the Swedish team that won the 1952 European Championship, but is best-known for composing wonderful declarer-play problems. Wohlin could see 11 tricks via one spade, five hearts and five diamonds. But to cash those five hearts, he needed a dummy entry. And so anticipating the likely 3-1 diamond break, declarer discarded a low spade from the dummy instead of ruffing the second club.

Then, when East continued with the club ace, Wohlin ruffed in hand with the diamond nine. Now it was easy to draw trumps in three rounds, unblock the ace-king of hearts, cross to dummy by leading the carefully preserved diamond five to dummy's six, and run the rest of the hearts.

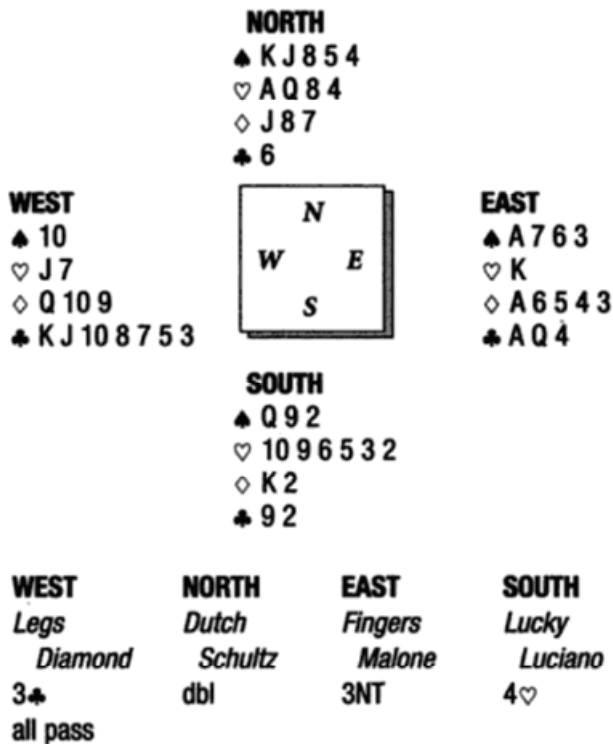
Note that East defended well by playing the second club. If South had ruffed it in the dummy, the contract would no longer have been makeable.

Honor Among Thieves By Zia Mahmood

The Devil's Coup, the Smother Play, the Scissors Coup, the Coup with No Name — despite sounding like a series of horror film titles to rival Nightmare on Elm Street 13, these are simply labels for some of the more interesting gambits that occur at the bridge table. A coup that is perhaps less well-known goes by the irresistible name of the 'Alcatraz Coup: This is the story of how it came into being. There was not much to do on the island prison of Alcatraz, but four of the inmates had formed a regular bridge game at the instigation of the appropriately named 'Legs' Diamond. The form of scoring was, of course, Chicago — a form of rubber bridge in which four deals are played with each partner. The vulnerability is pre-set, and there are bonuses for any game contract.

For 'Fingers' Malone, Diamond's partner, it had not been a happy Chicago. On the second hand, with North-South only vulnerable, West dealt these cards:



North made an aggressive entry into the auction over the opening 3♣, but as is well known, Schultz had acquired his nickname because his favorite call was 'Double. Fingers as East tried 3NT, hoping to avoid a heart lead. But 'Lucky' Luciano bid 4♥, relying on the astounding good fortune that he always enjoyed. This time, it seemed that his luck had run out when Legs Diamond led his singleton spade. Dummy played low, Fingers played the ♠A, and Luciano dropped the ♠Q. Falsecards were of course mandatory in this company, but it was possible that West had led from ♠1092, so Fingers took a while over his next move. Eventually, he had what was for him quite a bright idea — he would cash the ♦A. If partner played an encouraging card, he would

cash the ♣A and play another diamond. If, instead, Legs discouraged on the ♦A — confirming that the opening lead had been a singleton.

Fingers would switch back to spades. The ♦A was greeted by the ♦2 from declarer and the ♦9 from West, which Fingers construed as an encouraging card because it looked high. Following his master plan, he cashed the ♣A and played a second diamond. But Luciano won the ♦K and led a heart to the ace — with his usual luck, the singleton ♥K fell, and he claimed the contract. There was an ominous silence as three things slowly dawned on Fingers’s far from powerful intellect. First, 5♣ would have made in comfort for East-West. Second, the ♦9 had been the lowest out-standing card in the suit, and therefore not an encouraging signal at all. Finally, Diamond was idly scratching his left leg, which in normal circumstances would not have been disturbing, but Fingers knew what was strapped to the limb in question. The final deal of the Chicago gave Fingers the chance to make amends.

North’s bidding had been aggressive, but all things considered, that was not surprising. The opening lead was ♠10, which gave nothing away. Fingers knew only too well that people who made two mistakes playing with Legs Diamond did not live long enough to make three, so he simply could not afford to go down in the grand slam. Was there a way to improve his chances of locating the crucial ♥Q, which on the face of it was a 50-50 proposition? There is no better stimulus than terror to even the bluntest of intelligences, and suddenly Fingers had another brainwave. He would claim 100 for honors, pretending to hold ♥AQJ10! Whichever opponent held the ♥Q would know that Fingers could not

possibly have honors, since the ♥K was in dummy, and would be bound to give the show away. “Well bid, partner,” said Fingers confidently, “and we have 100 for honors, what’s more.” Luciano, his right-hand opponent, wrote down 100 above the line on his scorecard, but Schultz on his left ignored the comment and stared unblinkingly at Fingers. This was all the help that declarer needed — surely, Dutch had the missing ♥Q. Winning the spade lead with dummy’s ace, Fingers led a heart to his ace and ran the ♥J, and the Alcatraz Coup was born. So also, alas, was the Counter-Alcatraz Coup, and since that ill-starred Chicago, the luckless declarer’s name had to be changed to `No Fingers Malone. You see, when East won the ♥J with the queen, Diamond reached for the nearest weapon to hand, which happened to be the knife strapped to his left leg...
