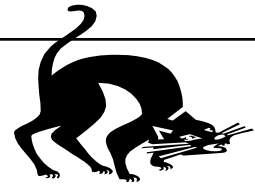

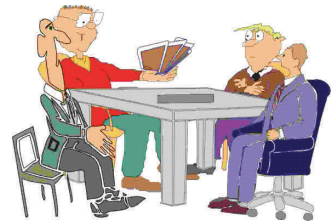

The Championship Flight and Flight A events will take place over four sessions and will be concluded in a single weekend. **\*\*In Flight B alone, there may be two teams remaining at conclusion of play on Sunday. These teams will be responsible to determine a final date and place (area club) at which to play their Final. The Coordinator will work with the teams to find suitable arrangements for Final.\*\*** (See CoC on the District 13 website for more information.) Flight C will be a two-session Swiss Team event played to conclusion on **Sunday only**.

There will be no competition among flights. Players must choose the flight in which they plan to play.

Championship	Unlimited	None
Flight A	Fewer than 6000 points	None
Flight B	Fewer than 2500 points	Determined by Unit
Flight C	Non Life Master and fewer than 500 points	Determined by Unit

Flight eligibility is established by ACBL's September 2016 masterpoint cycle. This information was produced on August 6, 2016 in Horn Lake, MS. **Masterpoints won after this cycle will not impact flight eligibility for these events.**

Players must reside in District 13. Each member of the team must be a paid member in good standing with the ACBL. Club qualifying may be required at the discretion of each Unit. A Flight B or C team may qualify under the rules of any Unit where a plurality of team members reside.

In addition, players who are currently, or have ever been in the past, members of another bridge organization, whether domestic (e.g., American Bridge Association) or foreign (e.g., Polski Związek Brydza Sportowego), must submit information on their past and/or current ranking in that organization. Submissions must be in writing (email is fine) and must be received by the District GNT Coordinator or District 13 Director at the time of registration for the event. The information submitted may be used to assign a conversion to ACBL masterpoints for purposes of verifying flight eligibility.

**\*\*An entry in the CHAMPIONSHIP Flight is a commitment to play in the National Final. Entries in lower flights may play to conclusion before declaring intent. We understand your reluctance to commit in advance.\*\***

So much emphasis has been placed on high card point count in recent years that the role of distribution all too often is given a back seat in the evaluation of a hand.

This deal was played in a team-of-four championship many years ago. The East player was George Reith, one of the founders of the one-over-one system, which is a fundamental part of our present day methods of bidding.

Reith also promulgated a high-card point count system of evaluation that was in use as early as 1930. He opened the bidding with one heart and eventually reached six hearts after his partner (Clement Read) had given him a raise.

When North then bid six spades, Reith doubled, holding four top tricks and 19 high-card points. He certainly had a reasonable expectation of defeating the contract. This turned out to be impossible, however, since East- West could take no more than one trick — the club ace. Declarer ruffed his three hearts in dummy, and lost only one club trick due to the location of the A Q in front of the K J.

It would be unfair to criticize Reith's double, even though the slam could not be defeated the way the cards were stacked. His high card values were annihilated by the freak distribution of the North-South hands. At the other table, the bidding was equally frantic. Reith's team-mates (Benedict Jarmel and Ralph Hirschberg) also bid six spades over six hearts but they were less fortunate.

The East-West pair Jo Culbertson and Al Morehead carried on to seven hearts (which could be held to down one). But Jarmel and Hirschberg, unwilling to run the risk of having a vulnerable grand slam scored against them, continued on to seven spades — down one — and the Reith team lost 1310 points on the deal.

# Bridge & Humor: Prodigal Son has Last Laugh

One of the most important elements of any successful partnership is bidding discipline. It takes quite a bit of will power to resist every tempting bidding fling, but when a father-son combination is involved, the generation gap might add a few laughs to a touchy situation. Today's hand was played by internationalist star Sidney Lazard of New Orleans and his son, Sidney Jr. The younger Lazard succumbed to the irresistible and received some fatherly advice. However, when the hand was over, Sidney Jr. got in the last word and the dialog was priceless.

Sidney Jr. opened four spades and West had a painful decision. If he doubled, he might well trade a vulnerable game or slam for a small penalty and if he bid, he had no truly descriptive bid available. After an anguishing moment, he decided on four no-trump — generally played as a three suit takeout over four spades.

East misinterpreted the bid and bid his better minor — East thought West had bid an unusual no-trump for , the minors. At this point, Sidney Jr., yielded to temptation and rebid his eight card suit (one of the most undisciplined moves a pre-emptor can make is to unilaterally rebid his own values).

And that was the conversation stopper of the tournament.

# Making a Plan By David Baker

This deal is from the Friday night Worldwide Pairs game held at our club. It contains many instructive lessons in both play and defense. I have slightly modified the hands, switching the opposition of the king and jack of hearts in order to present an extra lesson.

This might change the auction, but will have no impact on the final contract. Rather than presenting it as a problem, I thought it would be more beneficial to see all four hands from the beginning.

**Remember:** Bridge is a timed event. Keep up the pace of the event. You will have more time for dinner, drinks and discussion after the session!



**Lesson 1:** West opens one notrump. East, who knows the magic number for six notrump is 33 high card points, could have bid four clubs (Gerber, asking for aces), just to make sure they weren't missing two of them. Instead, feeling an urgent need to "wash his hands", he just blasted to six notrump. If you are a slave to high card points when you are bidding a hand, you are doing yourself a disservice, because good bidding is based on the length of your suits and the degree of fit(s) that you and your partner have. Note to die-hard highcarders: it is often wise to deduct a point on 4-3-3-3 hands because they don't play very well. The West hand has a ten, nine, eight and seven to make up for it being a questionable one-notrump opener.

**Lesson 2:** Do you make an active lead or a passive lead? Sometimes the opponents have found a trump fit and suggested a long side-suit as a source of tricks. That is the time you should attack (active). Attacking can mean leading away from your unsupported honour in the hope of finding partner with something worthwhile in the suit. Sometimes it is not clear that you need to attack, or your hand does not seem to have a suitable suit for attacking purposes. That is the time you should make a neutral lead (passive). A neutral lead is sometimes from a sequence such as queen-jack-ten or jack-ten-nine, or a lead from any bad suit that is not likely to give declarer a trick.

Sometimes a lead can be both aggressive and neutral at the same time, such as a lead from a king, queen, jack sequence, which may build a trick for your side but give nothing to declarer.

It is often difficult to decide on opening lead whether to be active or passive. After the opening lead, you may continue to be active or passive, but oftentimes you will switch back and forth between the two, depending on how the play has gone. I have found that is hard for normally aggressive players to learn to go passive and for normally passive players to learn to go active. Work on it. On this hand, North leads the 'passive' ten of hearts.

**Lesson 3:** Count your tricks. Declarer can make three spade tricks (if he is lucky), three hearts, three diamonds (if the queen is onside) and two clubs, which adds up to only 11 tricks. It is clear that you need to find the queen of clubs. If you make four club tricks, you won't need the diamond finesse. If you only make two spade tricks, then you do need the diamond finesse. UGH! You need to try spades first in order to find out whether you need two or three diamond tricks.

**Lesson 4:** The best way to play this kind of spade suit is to lead twice towards the hand with two honors in the suit. If North has the doubleton ace, it will pop up on your second lead of the suit without your wasting an honor. If South has the doubleton ace, you were always going to play an honor to force the ace and you were always going to have only two spade tricks, the ten being set up as the master in the suit. You have too many problems on this hand to ever think about finessing for the ten of spades. So you win the ten of hearts lead with the king and lead the seven of spades to the king. If South ducks the first spade, lead a heart to your queen and try spades again. When the ten appears, you have your three spade tricks. If South wins the first spade and leads a heart, you achieve the same result.

**Lesson 5:** On the third and fourth rounds of spades, North will probably throw hearts. You can then cash your last heart and the ace and king of diamonds (you throw the diamond eight from West on the fourth spade and North pitches a diamond as well). At this point, you have seen North play:

♠ 10 4

Does this not strongly suggest to you where the queen of clubs might be? You play the ace and then the ten of clubs for a finesse and score up a well-earned 1440 for six notrump bid and made. The club suit was left to the end because playing the other suits first will often give you enough information to determine who is more likely to hold a certain card in a suit. The odds will tell you that when you are missing five cards in a suit and one opponent is known to have three or more cards in that suit, that is the person more likely to have the card you are looking for. Sometimes, the play to the crucial point of the hand will tell you that a certain opponent has all five of the cards in the suit you were worried about!

**Lesson 6:** An expert North player who is aware of what you are doing might be able to fool you in either of two situations: (i.) On the actual deal, North might discard a club, leaving you to wonder whether he had only low clubs and thus no queen, or; (ii.) If he had started with  $\heartsuit Q107652$ ,  $\clubsuit 3$ , he might play his diamonds in the order five, ten, queen, knowing that his diamonds were useless from your plays in the suit. In the end, he would have  $\heartsuit 762$ ,  $\clubsuit 3$ , and you would go down. What could you do? Nothing!

Sometimes a good player will see what you are doing and devise a strategy to fool you. You will pay the price, sincerely say, "Nicely played," and move on to the next deal. You cannot play every deal against sneaky expert players as if they are doing something to fool you. Be aware of the small plays they may make to fool you, but reward them if they make a big play that works. If you spend all your time worrying about a big con job, you will end up giving away more matchpoints or IMPs by messing up the simple deals.

**COUNTING** Count your winners and count your losers. If the total doesn't come to 13, count your cards. Alfred Sheinwold

# Bridge Logic: The Real Expert

Here is a gem played by Bob Hamman at the 2008 Boston National Championships. After some fairly non-descript bidding, the many time World Champion landed in 3NT and was faced with the lead of ♥10.

Would you have found the winning line that he did? Your first thoughts are about missing the small slam in clubs if ♣K is right. However, 3NT is a great contract and seems a wee bit too easy. At times like this, you need to ask yourself what can go wrong. Then find a plan to make sure you can cope with it. Where can you run into rough weather on this hand? The answer is slightly counter-intuitive: diamonds, not hearts!

The aim must be to prevent East getting in early and leading a diamond towards the King, held by West. As you win the heart at trick one, it is important to recognize that if the club finesse loses and West holds the other two kings you are held to just 8 tricks – losing 3 diamonds, a spade and a club! The simple contract has just landed in the doldrums. So what is the solution to arrive at 9 tricks?

Lead the club 10 to the Ace and return ♠Q. In case East covers the card, your worries are over. Just drive out club King for 9 tricks. Unfortunately, West wins and returns a low heart. Now you cash the 2 high spades and hope the 10 drops. No such luck. Continue with the ♣9, which is won by East with the King. East shifts to the ♦J, but you are home and dry. The queen is covered by the King but all is well with your world – two tricks in each major, 4 clubs and a diamond adding to nine. The master play was crossing to ♣A at trick 2 to play spade queen and prevent the diamonds being attacked from the wrong side. You are among the best if you found the winning line!

The West hand was ♠K10843♥105♦K876♣72.

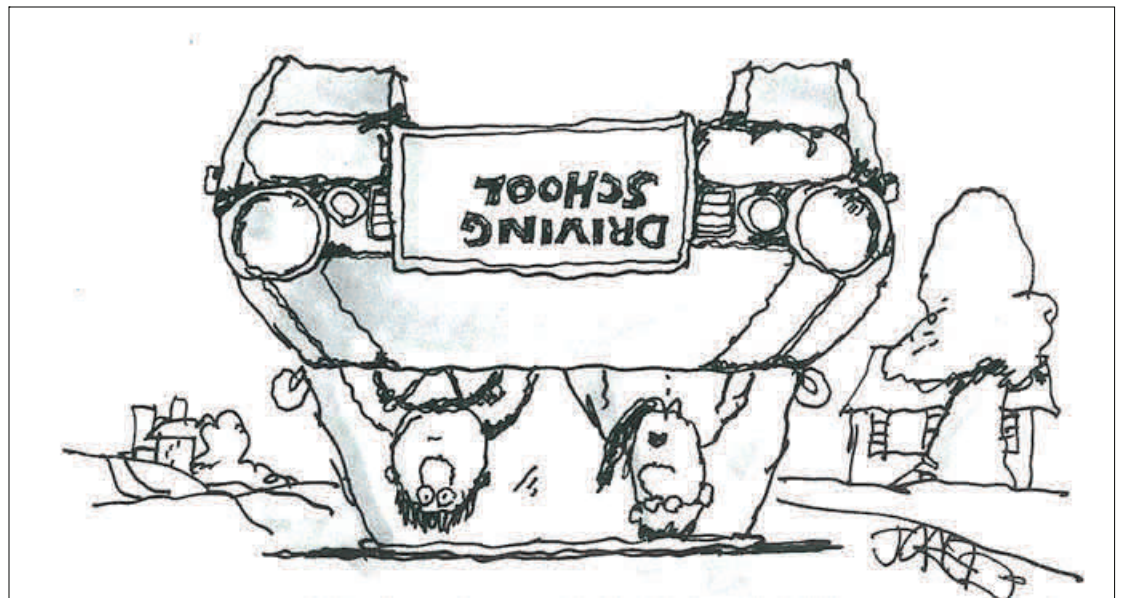


Almost 90% of the bridge players on the planet would land in 3NT on this deal regardless of their bidding system. The equally interesting truth is that less than one in every hundred declarers would make the contract! West starts with the ♣J and East follows with the 7.

You have started life with eight top tricks. Where do you hope to find the ninth? The major suits are hopeless. The club suit could be your savior if it divides 3-3, which seems against the odds after the lead. Is there a way to guarantee 2 diamond tricks with your combined holding? If East has the King, problem solved. If the suit breaks 3-3, it is possible to establish a second trick no matter where the King lies by playing the suit thrice. But there is a “best solution” to find 2 diamond tricks with this combination!

Play a low diamond from both hands at trick 2! Assume the defense shifts to a major suit at the third trick. Declarer wins in hand, cashes ♦A, and assuming the King fails to drop, cashes a second club. If both defenders follow to the second club, try a third club! If clubs fail to split evenly, cross to ♠A and lead a diamond towards Qx.

This line succeeds whenever diamonds are 3-3, or East has the diamond King to any length as well as when West has either a singleton or doubleton King (which is why the odds favor this play in comparison with the immediate diamond finesse)! For academic interest, it also caters to the remote possibility of an even split in clubs. The West hand was ♠J97 ♥Q85 ♦K2 ♣J10982.
