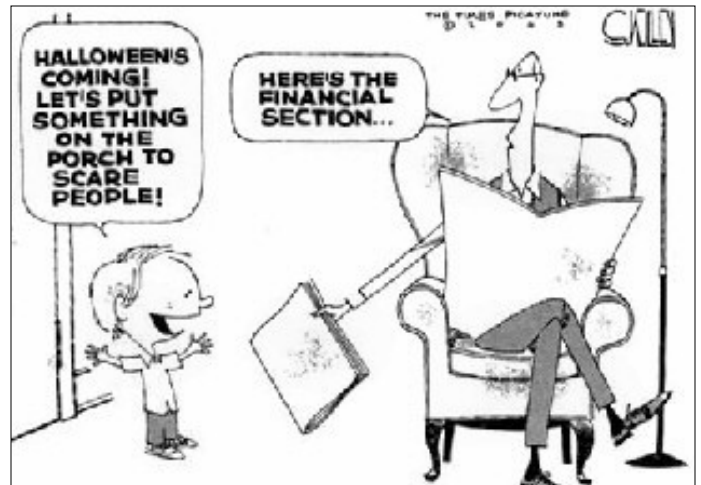

The Championship Flight and Flight A events will take place over four sessions and will be concluded in a single weekend. ****In Flight B alone, there may be two teams remaining at conclusion of play on Sunday. These teams will be responsible to determine a final date and place (area club) at which to play their Final. The Coordinator will work with the teams to find suitable arrangements for Final.**** (See CoC on the District 13 website for more information.) Flight C will be a two-session Swiss Team event played to conclusion on **Sunday only**.

There will be no competition among flights. Players must choose the flight in which they plan to play.

Flight A	Fewer than 6000 points	None

Flight C	Non Life Master and fewer than 500 points	Determined by Unit

Flight eligibility is established by ACBL's September 2016 masterpoint cycle. This information was produced on August 6, 2016 in Horn Lake, MS. **Masterpoints won after this cycle will not impact flight eligibility for these events.**

Players must reside in District 13. Each member of the team must be a paid member in good standing with the ACBL. Club qualifying may be required at the discretion of each Unit. A Flight B or C team may qualify under the rules of any Unit where a plurality of team members reside.

In addition, players who are currently, or have ever been in the past, members of another bridge organization, whether domestic (e.g., American Bridge Association) or foreign (e.g., Polski Związek Brydza Sportowego), must submit information on their past and/or current ranking in that organization. Submissions must be in writing (email is fine) and must be received by the District GNT Coordinator or District 13 Director at the time of registration for the event. The information submitted may be used to assign a conversion to ACBL masterpoints for purposes of verifying flight eligibility.

****An entry in the CHAMPIONSHIP Flight is a commitment to play in the National Final. Entries in lower flights may play to conclusion before declaring intent. We understand your reluctance to commit in advance.****

Don't Play Idle Cards Thoughtlessly By Jean Besse from <http://www.ibpa.com/>

Idle cards are those that can neither make tricks nor prevent the enemy from making tricks, nor act as guards to important cards. They seem to have no practical use at all.

And yet idle cards can exert an influence, even though it may be hard to pin down. They are like the neutrinos of nuclear physics, which are of minute mass and seem not to affect other particles but which have mysterious powers. There is only one way you can penetrate the mystery. Before playing an idle card, you should consider what the effect of playing it may be. We begin with an ordinary hand, where the bidding was simple and direct: South: 2NT North: 7NT!

You are West:

You lead the ♦10 and dummy's king wins the trick, East and South following low. Declarer cashes the ♦Q and leads a diamond to the Ace in his hand.

DISCARD? Clearly, a heart would be suicidal; a club may be dangerous. It seems safe to throw a spade: idle card. You have just killed the defense! The full deal on the left... After the first three tricks, declarer intends to run four clubs and three spades. When West shows out on the third spade he will learn that West was dealt three. He already knows that West had two diamonds. So now he will know that West had exactly three hearts. South will therefore easily pick up your unfortunate ♥Q. To give yourself a chance, you had to keep your spades intact, discarding a club instead on the third diamond and leaving South with a complete guess. East, too, had to take care of his idle cards. When the fourth round of clubs was played, he had to discard a diamond, not a spade. A discard of a spade from either defender allows declarer to find out the spade distribution and hence the distribution of the entire hand. Like neutrinos those "idle" spades had mysterious and

unexpected powers.

Robert Sheehan as South was one who found a successful line of play. He won the club king lead with the ♣A, ruffed a club — noting East’s echo, and cashed the ♠K, West discarding a club. Faced with a trump loser, Sheehan set out to partially strip the hand before putting East in. He cashed the ♥K, crossed to a top trump, cashed ♥A, and ruffed a heart, and then exited with a trump, leaving East on lead in this position:

East had no more clubs and clearly did not want to open diamonds, so he led a heart, a “neutrino”, THEREBY DISCLOSING WEST’S FOURTH HEART! Sheehan could now place West with 0-4-1-8, so he ruffed in his hand and played a small diamond. He called for dummy’s ♦K and continued with a finesse against the queen to complete the good work. Again, the play of the “idle” heart sabotaged the defense. EAST MUST RETURN A LOW DIAMOND, accepting the risk of leading into the tenace, should South hold the ♦J. Had East done so, South would have had to guess. And if you look at the hand closely, you will find that he will go for the losing line more often than not. So, my BOLS tip is this: Don’t play an idle card thoughtlessly. Consider what the effect of playing it may be. If played at the wrong time, an idle card may betray your whole hand.

Pillsbury Doughboy's Obituary

The Pillsbury Doughboy died yesterday of a yeast infection and complications from repeated pokes in the belly. He was 73. Doughboy was buried in a lightly greased coffin.

Dozens of celebrities turned out to pay their respects at his funeral, including Mrs Butterworth, Hungry Jack, the California Raisins, Betty Crocker, the Hostess Twinkies. Captain Crunch sent his apologies. The gravesite was piled high with flours.

Aunt Jemima delivered the eulogy in the graveyard and lovingly described Doughboy as a man who did not realize how much he was kneaded. Doughboy rose quickly in show business, but his later life was filled with turnovers. He was not considered a very 'smart' cookie, wasting much of his dough on half-baked schemes. Despite being a little flaky at times, he still, even as a crusty old man, was considered a roll model for millions.

Doughboy is survived by his wife, Playa Dough; two children, John Dough and Jane Dough; plus they have one in the oven. He is also survived by his elderly father, Pop Tart. The funeral was held at 2:50 for about 20 minutes.

This grave story therefore is very interesting.

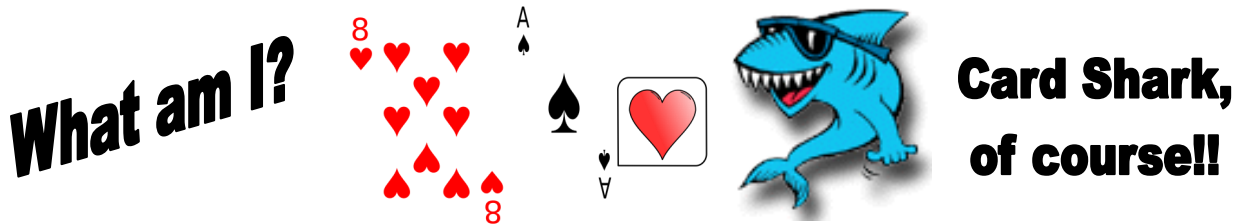

To make your contract on this hand, you have to keep the bidding in mind.

You are in 4♠, as South, on the king of diamonds lead. You ask about West's 3♦ bid and you hear that it shows a six card suit and 11-15 HCP. You win ♦A and your first decision is how to tackle trumps. Do you start with the king or the ace?

The normal play is the king because if East shows out you can pick up the suit without loss, but do you think West could have all four spades? Not really. That would give East a void in spades along with three card diamond support. With that, East would surely have raised diamonds. So you start by playing a spade to the ace because West could easily be void. Just as you feared, West throws a diamond on this trick. You play a trump from dummy and when East plays the ten you let it hold. East plays a diamond to West. West plays ♥A and another one to your king.

To make your contract, you have to avoid losing a club. How do you do this? West seems to have six diamonds and no spades. Of his remaining seven cards, he is unlikely to have five hearts which means he must hold at least three clubs. This gives you a choice. You could play the ace-king to drop the doubleton queen with East or you could play West to hold the queen – lead the jack in the hope of pinning the ten. Which do you choose?

West's intermediate jump overcall might tip you off about the location of the ♣Q, so make him regret his bid and run the jack of clubs. West cannot gain by covering with the queen, because East's ten will drop on the second round, establishing your nine.

Quack Quack ... Duck!

Sofia, August 30, 2016

Recently I watched on BBO an interesting board involving some very good Bulgarian players. South was Mr. Christo Drumev– World Senior Pairs Champion 2002 in Montreal, well known in bridge circles in Europe, long time chairman of Bulgarian Bridge Federation, but quite new in BBO.

North was Mr. Liudmil Iliev from the town of Vidin, who is very active in bridge activities and teaches bridge to youngsters.

West was Mr. Tenyu Tenev from Haskovo, member of the Executive Board of Bulgarian Bridge Federation and coach of the Bulgarian Senior Team in Chennai for the World Championship last year.

And finally East – the cherry of the cake – was Ms Gergana Teneva– his daughter, who at age 16 is the current National Mixed Pairs Champion partnered by her father.

The bidding was simple – 1 Heart by W (both in red), two passes and after some sophisticated bidding by North and South, Mr. Drumev lands at 3 NT. West has no attractive lead and tries exploratory diamonds – winning trick one.

A second diamond – winning again. However the situation becomes very suspicious and Mr. Tenev switches to CQ – all other play low, declarer carefully throws C9. West continues with CJ and Gergana ducks again.

Now Mr. Drumev is helpless and soon gives up. He easily develops a club trick in dummy but it is not enough – one down.

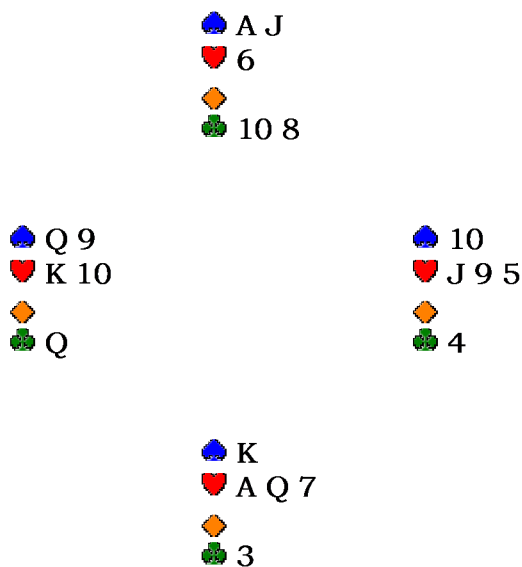

Consider what might happen if Gergana took her Ace without delay. If she continues hearts or clubs what seems quite natural, her father will be squeezed in three suits and finally end-played.

The only way for the defense to survive at this crucial moment is Gergana after the ♣A to switch to spades to kill the only entry to dummy. Declarer might throw-in West at the end but this will produce the eight trick only. Not easy to see this spade switch after the ♣A.

Suppose that Gergana ducks the first club but takes the second one. Now Mr. Drumev will jettison the king obtaining a new entry to dummy and easy nine tricks even if East plays a third club to leave spades blocked. West will be soon squeezed in majors.

You may say that West should have played small club at any time. This might help but the defense still must be on the alert. Let's see what might happen if Mr. Tenev selects club five after the diamonds. East will take her ace and might continue clubs. Declarer will cash all diamonds arriving on this position:



Now a club to West and declarer claims nine tricks squeezing West in majors.

Therefore after the ♣A East should attack hearts to remove that vital reentry to declarer's hand in the ending. A spade switch instead of hearts after the Ace of clubs is also fine, cutting at once declarer's communications with dummy.

Now you see how simply Gergana managed the situation ducking clubs twice and avoiding any complications in defense.

Hand Evaluation for Responder by John McIlrath

Your partner opens the bidding with 1♦ and you hold:

♠ K J 4 ♥ A 9 5 4 ♦ Q ♣ Q 10 8 4 2

As responder you need to ask yourself – what is the ‘worth’ of my hand, how do I best describe my hand, how do I think the auction will develop and to what level? This is why chess players make good bridge players because they have the ability to think out the several moves ahead not just the one at hand.

So, what is your hand worth, do you have 12 HCP? Do you just blithely bid 2♣, or do you discount your singleton ♦Q and bid 1♥. Are you strong enough to force to game? Do you show your 4- card major in preference to your 5-card minor?

So you bid 2♣, and now what does the opener (your partner) think you have? You bypassed the majors, so you denied (on the surface) holding four cards in either of these suits and you have 10+ points as you bid a new suit at the 2-level. If the opener now bids 2♥ is this a reverse bid, showing a strong hand of 16+ points, or do you play this as just an ongoing description bid? This last question is a matter of partnership discussion. When this hand came up in our club teams’ championship, I would have preferred that my partner had bid 1♥ rather than 2♣, because as the opener I now showed my 4-card heart suit, unsure as to whether I was making a reverse bid or not. My partner now bid 4♥. Before North lead ♠10, he asked East if my 2♥ was a reverse, and guess what the answer was? Yes, of course ... well, I didn’t have my bid then and as dummy was displayed, he said “don’t make too many tricks.” I just made my 10 tricks, losing one trick in each of spades, hearts and clubs.

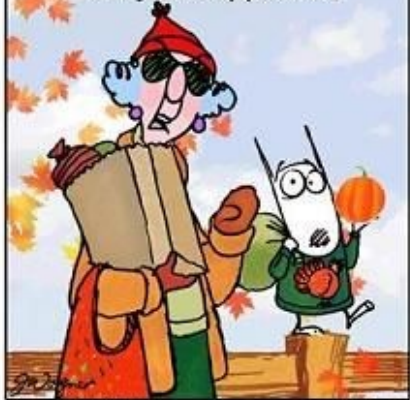

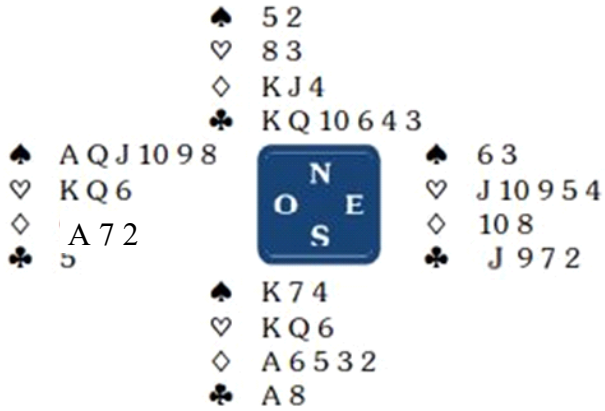

In this hand, it is easy to risk being distracted, take immediately, play the ace of clubs and play clubs. With the hand below, however, you will end up down:



There are two ways to make nine tricks.

The first is to make: 1 spade, 2 diamonds and 6 clubs.

The second is to make: 1 spade, 5 diamonds and 3 clubs.

You should try both. But you have to make 5 diamond tricks, you must probably finesse dummy's valet (play the ace and the king while you have communication with clubs, to play for the Qx is against the chances).

Therefore, win the first trick, play a club to dummy's king and repeat another club to the ace. If the suit is OK, go back to dummy with the king of diamonds and run the club suit.

In this hand, however, West discards a heart in the second round of clubs. Therefore, you have to play a diamond to dummy's jack, and continue with the ace and claim your nine tricks. This is a case in which to collect first the honor of the short side (the ace of clubs) does not work.
